

2019HIGHLIGHTS



God has been moving MIGHTILY in Honduras! In 2019, the ministry in Western Honduras baptized about 750 new believers and saw around 1,200 people accept the Lord Jesus as their Savior. Seven new churches were planted in the mountains where discipleship and evangelism continue to expand.



The online Biblical and ministry training launched several years ago by our Harvest America missionaries to train new church planters continues to expand. In 2019, 71 students were involved in this training, including several from our campus ministries. Starting the year with 10 cohorts, new classes were begun in Rwanda, Africa; Grand Rapids, MI; Seattle, WA; and Scotts Valley, CA. In addition to Spanish, the classes are being translated into Khmer (for Cambodian students), and a Congolese cohort in Denver is interested in translating the training into Swahili.



On September 14, Rigoberto Reyes, the Director of Central America Ministries, presided over a commissioning ceremony for 17 (31 counting spouses!) new indigenous missionaries from Honduras and El Salvador. This was the single biggest appointment of missionaries in one day in the history of Missions Door! "It was a great day of joy and celebration," Rigo said. Three years ago, Rigo started training these new missionaries through the BEE (Biblical Education by Extension) program, which provides the foundation for a strategy to plant churches. "They are the best church planters I've ever met," Rigo said.

Sankofa Student Ministries

On November 17, missionary Mack White was celebrated for his 47 years of ministry and 80 years of life. Mack and Joan White were appointed in 1972 to minister to African American college students in Chicago and across the Midwest. The ministry adopted the name of Sankofa Student Ministries, capturing the identity of an African-American student ministry stretching from Chicago to Kenya. "Mack is a one of a kind white man who goes to a predominantly Black Westside church and started a college ministry to support and train hundreds of Black college students. He would travel all over the state and country to visit students and do Bible study and pray with them."

Port-au-Prince Church Sends Out a Mission Team

You don't have to leave your own country to go on a mission trip! In August, Friendship Baptist Church in Port-au-Prince, sent a mission team to the Central Plateau, an area in the center of the country of Haiti surrounded by mountains, where access is difficult over winding roads. The team spent seven days in this remote region, spreading the Gospel to the people living in the countryside, and providing training for leadership, children's ministry, women's ministry, and evangelism. The immediate fruit of this ministry was 45 people who embraced Jesus as their personal Savior and Lord!

God is at Work in Cambodia

Missions Door missionaries, Radha and Ravy Manickam, work in 15 of the 25 provinces in Cambodia, training leaders to pastor and plant churches. 2019 was a very fruitful year in the nation that is about 98 percent Buddhist. Over 200 people committed their lives to Christ and were baptized through Cambodian Ministries for Christ. About one hundred leaders are in training. These leaders are multiplying by starting discipleship ministries and new churches.

Four Decades of Japanese Ministry

After 40 years of missionary service in Japan and Southern California, Phil and Sharyn Waters completed their full-time ministry and officially retired. They remain in awe of God's power as they reflect upon a career dedicated in service to Christ and the Japanese population, both in the United States and abroad. So what lies ahead for Phil as he transitions into an affiliate role with Missions Door? The mission doesn't end with retirement. "I am going to keep doing what I am doing, teaching Japanese Bible studies and ministering among the Japanese community," he says. "God has a way of surprising us and getting us out of our comfort zones."

Breaking the Silence with a Message of Hope

In 2019, the Signs of Love ministry to the deaf grew in South America when Missions Door missionary, Morgen Cash, moved from Honduras to join missionary Rachel Lewis in Peru. Rachel and Morgen have been ministering to five rural villages around their home base of Cajamarca. In each village, they search for deaf members of the community, who Rachel and Morgen call the "Beloveds." Last year, Rachel and Morgen reached almost one hundred Beloveds with the message of Jesus' love for them.

College Students Decide to Follow Jesus

Our 67 missionaries on 26 college campuses continue to share the Gospel with lost students who joyfully respond to Christ's invitation to come and follow Him. In 2019, 29 new believers joined the Kingdom of God and 19 were baptized into community declaring their allegiance to Jesus as Savior and Lord. In June, all of our domestic and international campus ministers gathered in NY along with Missions Door leaders for an incredible time of vision, unity, and healing. The Campus team grew in understanding, commitment, and joy in the calling God has given them to care for the next generation of leaders in college. It was a great week filled with healing and hope. Praise God for using our campus ministries to share the Good News with international, American and Mexican students.
